March 15

County board holds special meeting to officially vote on several COVID-19 related actions

March 17

CA email to employees: Additional measures for remote work effective March 20, mandating that all employees who can work from home, do so, and thank you message for employees from the county administrator

March 19

The county administrator requests additional staff to help, if available, in Human Services areas

March 23

March 16

Hennepin County Board Chair declares state of emergency, announces closure of public facing library, human service center and licensing service center services as of March 17

March 18

CA email to employees: County board decisions to authorize paid time off, negative leave balances, workplace changes, and improved benefits for the COVID-19 emergency

March 21

Hennepin County announces that 130 people experiencing homelessness are moved to alternative accommodations, and Hennepin County announces supply drop-off drive beginning March 22

March 25

CA email to employees: Overview of the Stay at Home order and what it means for employees

County changes made in preparation

- Cancelling/postponing public and internal events to promote social distancing
- Closing public-facing services at all 41 libraries, human service centers, and licensing service centers
- Authorizing employees to work from home
- Allowing parents/guardians to care for their children while working remotely
- Authorizing operational changes at county facilities
- Working with the state to relax or eliminate requirements regarding face to face interactions

External Outreach/Efforts

- Ongoing communication with county administrators throughout 7 county metro area
- Host Hennepin County delegation meetings/all 51 members attended
 - Update legislators on county operational priorities
 - Present priority funding and regulatory needs
- Contact with NACo group of administrators from largest counties
- Work with contracted providers, community groups and county partners to coordinate messaging to the Legislature and the Governor's office to secure funding and regulatory support


Shelter in Place

- In effect Friday, March 27, at 11:59 p.m. to Friday, April 10, at 5 p.m.
- Based decisions on modeling done by Department of Health and University of Minnesota
- Intended to give the state more time to fully prepare
- Preparations include building hospital capacity, more equipment, and testing capabilities
- Critical workers are exempt Our employees know their status
 - Many broad categories and individuals that support these functions.




Confirmed cases in Hennepin County






Isolation and Quarantine Efforts

Current status of I and Q capacity - Active sites



\$1.3 million/ monthly cost for current isolation capacity (306 units)*




Jail Population Down 34%

Delivery of service through innovation

Innovative approaches using technology

- Move call centers to home locations for continued delivery of service
- Broader use of Adobe for remote electronic signing of document
- Video technology taking the place of face-to-face for required professional visits
- Telehealth software used by health line of business to perform virtual patient visits
- Facebook Live story time to provide age-appropriate family activities that support early literacy with familiar community librarians

Microsoft Teams 3/14-3/20

- Rolled out countywide in one-week with ongoing training and support, so that all employees could more effectively collaborate and work remotely.
- Over 5,000 county employees have used
- Staff have participated in more than 1,000 Teams meetings and calls

Innovative approaches using process change

- Centralized inventory, requests and distribution for critical supplies, utilizing STS crew leaders to deliver bulk ordered items to HC facilities
- Food shelves- shifting to "by appointment" pick ups of pre-packaging items rather than having clients "shop"
- Facility Services created and deployed 120 shields for client facing court counters
- Enhanced culturally specific outreach to inform on practical and critical interventions

Innovative approaches to sharing information

- Stood up coronavirus email inbox for centralized submission and triage of pandemic related questions
- Created employee COVID-19 information site on HC Connect
- Created public COVID-19 information site on hennepin.us

Hennepin Responds

- Deploy county staff to essential areas in need of additional help
- Organization wide message sent to employees asking for assistance
- 110 staff responded in just two days

We'll continue to explore innovative ways to deliver service

- Mail library patron material holds using existing Outreach system
- Use drop boxes where residents can drop off documents related to human services programs to be processed remotely by staff
- Enlist technology when remote work is recommended
- Deploy resources where help is needed
